"I Was Not Spared the Rod"

olepolole born Kago Motsoma, like many traditionally raised children knows very well the meaning of the long standing saying that goes 'spare the rod and spoil the child.'

During his upbringing, his parents used the cane to put him back on the straight and narrow line whenever he veered off. He is now grateful to one particular beating that drove him all the way to the summit as he leads the pack of over 40, 000 students who sat for Botswana General Certificate School Examination (BGCSE) in 2016. "My parents beat me to read," confessed the 8th Excellence Awards Golden Star. It is this beating that cultivated the culture of reading in him; at standard three he already conformed to a study timetable.

Kago does not only have the cane to thank for his achievement, staying with his grandmother also moulded him into a responsible person at a very young age. With a smile he looks at the skies probably as he paints the beautiful picture of him staying with his grandmother when he was doing standard four and five. It was just the two of them and his granny was old and did not have much sthrength to do household chores and the then ten (10) year old boy knew he had to step up to the challenging task of taking care of both of them. "We collected fire wood and I also had to do other house chores, coupled with my school work," he narrates. Difficult as it sounds he recalls it all with a smile; it's definitely the good old days. He shakes his head with disbelief to the reality that he amassed nine A* and an A from his ten subjects after all that seemingly made the mission impossible.

The former St. Joseph's College student surprised his teachers with his performance. Kago though a top excelling student he was not the best nor the second best. Mrs. Bontekanye Galeitsiwe his Head of House did not waste time in admitting that Kago did not top her wish list though he always told her he is going to surprise her. "He was always jolly and laughing so I didn't think he meant his words," she joyfully shared. Despite his lively humour, Galeitsiwe also remembers Kago as a committed student who always voluntarily wiped the chalk board for the next lesson. Mr. France Rankgomo who was Kago's Class Teacher also remembers him as a jolly person but reserved. "He was easy going and always had a smile," he observed. Unlike many excelling students Kago didn't shy away from the responsibility of being a prefect and take part in extracurricular activities. "He was actually a good table tennis player" Mr. Rankgomo attested.

The School Deputy Head Mr. Herbet Setume hails Kago's success to the strategies that the school has put in place to ensure academic excellence of the students and the school as a collective. Close monitoring and supervision of the school's learning processes makes the arsenal used by the school in pursuit of academic excellence. "Our school teachers know that they must meet their targets," he revealed. Though the school remains locked on the first position as the best performing school, he says their percentage pass is still below par. His superior Ms. Constance Male lauds the reigning discipline in the school for helping students like Kago perform to their best capabilities. "Our students guard jealously the reigning discipline because you cannot get good results with an indisciplined lot," she cautioned

Kago did not only promise to surprise his teachers but also his mother. Even before her lips could confess that she still has anxiety she long caught when results were released, Lankie Motsoma's body language is so loud. "I always took him lightly when he said he is going to surprise me," she shared as she shakes her head with disbelief. Though unbelievable, Kago's success story was inevitable. Above the hard work he put in his studies he is a disciplined child who has always shown traits of natural intelligence from a young age. "He always showed a good understanding of concepts while he was still a toddler," said the proud mother. A jolly playful character that Kago is, he still knows when to shelve the comedy and when to pull it out. His mother has nothing but praise for his utmost discipline as she reveals that he is a very good babysitter and has no match when it comes to baking setswana traditional scones Diphaphatha; a skill he inherited from his grandmother. So rooted is the young man such that he always reminded his mother they must make visiting the fields a habit. "He confused a mortar for a calabash in a test and he blamed my lack of interest in traditional life," she noted. It was then that she started helping him read Setswana literature and explained whatever her inquisitive boy did not understand, their team work was not in vain as he got an A* in Setswana.

Kago saved his pocket money to buy internet bundles to help him do some research on the internet. His advice to students aspiring to emulate him is that they should take responsibility of their studies and make sacrifices, especially cutting off things that do not matter much to a student's life like television and social media. Aerobatic Engineering is a profession Kago wishes to pursue. He says he wants to bridge the gap and reckons it can be used to improve farming technology and see the country's economy improve.

The humble child he is, Kago feels obliged to thank the Ramotswa Community who supported him and always gave him words of wisdom. "The Ramotswa community treated me like one of their own, indeed a child is raised by a village," he acknowledged.

The Ramotswa born former MSC student like her role models she also finished in the top three as runner up, walking home with a Ministerial Award. Susan addressed her former school students where she shared her tips of excellence. She has a special formula she simply calls the STUDENT Concept and broke it down for them by explaining what she made of each letter in the word student. She said student was made of acronyms representing, Student, Teamwork, Unwavering, Dedicated, Excellence, Notable and Tenacious. It is these seven pillars derived from 'student' that helped her realise her dream. "I wanted to be noticed and recognised for good things," she shared. The second time Excellence Award recipient implored MSC students to find motivation in everything especially family background. "I want my family to make a wish and I make it happen," she said to a cheering audience.

Susan missed the record of being the first student to get an Excellence Award at all the three levels, missing only the JCE badges in her collection. Having tasted glory at PSLE with her first Excellence Award, failing to defend her position at JCE was a bitter pill to swallow but the pain made her develop fear for failure and she came back stronger scooping the second position at BGCSE. She closed her pep talk with a quote borrowed from her role Model Kesegofetse Rauwe "Fear being ordinary, strive to be known."

The hard working student as noted by her Class Teacher Mr Obusitse Thapelo who says Susan always did extra work on her own. "She did not wait for teachers to give her assignments," applauded the proud teacher. Not only did she impress her teacher with her work rate, he also admired her respect and spirituality.

Ms Kelebile Hubona was Susan's Head of House and like her Class Teacher she remembers Susan as a very focused and humble hard working student. Hubona said one of the strategies they used to nurture their students was having them accounting for their marks every time they wrote tests.

Her school management team also played a notable role in her excellence. Mr. Mong-

wewarona the Mater Spei College Deputy School Head revealed that the school allows its students to discover their abilities. "She is a motivation to others," he said. The School Head Mr. Jabulani Munyere also reckons that instilling confidence in their students helps the school produce top achievers every year, which confirms that they are indeed a school of excellence. Munyere says they publish end of term results on the school notice boards and PTA rewards those that have done well to encourage the spirit of competition amongst their students. The School Head who from time to time interacted with Susan and other students says planning was her master tactic.

Susan's colourful results are not a surprise to her mother Rebecca Charlie who thinks her daughter has always been an intelligent hard worker. Rebecca narrates how she and her daughter used to draw the family budget and the young lady would be sent from Ramotswa to Gaborone to withdraw money, buy groceries and pay the bills; a challenging task she always executed with perfection. She was only a 12 years old girl when she confidently took the task, which proved not only her intelligence but maturity and life skills.

Speaking to Stars Magazine her mother who is a teacher in Borolong village near Francistown said her daughter's results did not come by luck or surprise they worked hard for them. "Every time she finished an examination we wrote down her forecast grade and all the 9 grades came as predicated," shared the proud mother. Rebecca's face has an everlasting expression of excitement as she narrates a long story about her daughter's excellence.

The mother says her daughter is so addicted to the phone, when it is her turn to cook they always eat late as she will be busy chatting on the phone while cooking. Although she is addicted to her phone she put all her electronic gadgets including laptop and tablet she won at a school prize giving in a black refuse bag and surrendered them to her mother to safely keep them and for three months she did not have her phone as she wanted to focus on her examinations.

Susan draws inspiration from Botswana Defence Force pilot Captain Kgomotso Phatsima, and would like to pursue a career in Aircraft Maintenance and Engineering. Her ultimate dream was to be the Golden Star award recipient. "I wanted to see myself in the Stars Magazine as the best student," she revealed. Though she did not win the presidential award finishing second is worthy a celebration especially that she got her forecast results.

One might conclude that the Gabane born former St. Joseph's College student Refilwe Kebadireng who regards herself a perfectionist and that she credits her perfectionism as her main drive to finishing as the third best student of the Class of 2016 BGCSE was a fly on the wall in Lombardi's team's dressing room to master his motto to an excellent execution. Refilwe who will receive the Chairman's Award for her achievement says she never got her desired grades in her twelve years of education until now. But what did it take to win it when it mattered most? Mr. Ketlametswe Dingalo who was Refilwe's class teacher, attributes it all to humility and focus by his student. "She was forward with her vision to become a Top Achiever," he shared. Dingalo says Refilwe even shared her dream to be amongst the country's best students with her parents in his presence during an open day. So bold a statement it sounded, but she was sure it was not impossible.

Her Head of House Mr. Michael Tabona also believes their student's master tactic was focus. "She was a very focused and concentrated more on her studies," he said. Refilwe's pursuit perfection was a joint effort not only by the student and her parents but other stakeholders as well, at least according to her Deputy School Head Mr. Herbert Setume. "There is hard work and hunger to perform well from all the parties including parents," acknowledged Setume. He went on to praise the School's PTA saying that they are the behind the scenes agent that makes things happen. Ms. Constance Male echoed Setume's words and also singled out the good relationship they have with their students' parents as one of their working strategies. Male went on to reveal that parents whose children fall short of five credits every time they have tests are summoned to the school to discuss ways to help their children meet the set targets.

Short tempered and sensitive are the common words that Refilwe's family use to describe her. Though sensitive and short tempered her elder sister Wame Mohubu couldn't have for a better sister. She says her little sister respects her and they are the best of friends. "Whenever she was stressed with exams she sent me texts and after talking to her she would be so cheered up like I said the best speech ever," she reflected. But like normal siblings they do fight, and guess over what; same shoe size problem! But the fights are only limited to the ladies over the wardrobe, her brother

Otsile Kebadireng says her sister is a sweet soul. "She is not an offensive person," he shared as the two siblings took a glance at each other and the spirit of brotherhood immediately lit their smiles.

Her mother Poifo Kampura says her genius is so sensitive sometimes she cries before the mother can even reprimand at her. Like a typical tswana young lady, Refilwe cooks and cleans but between the two she would choose cooking on any day. The genius in Refilwe is said to be a genetic inheritance from her biological father Thatayaone Magole. This is according to her aunt Gladys Magole who said the young lady has always wanted to prove a point of being the family's encyclopaedia. "She has always wanted to beat her father and he has since surrendered and declared her better than him," she said. Thuso Kampura is the top achiever's step dad and stays with her and the rest of the family. He says though they expected such brilliance from her they are short of words to caption such an honour bestowed to them by their daughter.

Her mother smiles and stare lovingly at her seemingly shy daughter as she recreates the day results were released and could not believe what her work computer screen put before her sight. "I couldn't contain my excitement, I shared the good news with my colleagues and everyone was happy for me," she flashed back. Poifo says her daughter has always been an intelligent student, so much that her teacher at Mophato Primary School in Francistown cried when she had to take a transfer to Gaborone. Refilwe's intelligence saw her skip standard four and almost skip standard six during her primary school days which she spent at private schools.

Refilwe discovered the perfectionist in her from an early age when she was doing standard one. "I realised I was the best and never wanted to come second," she shared with a straight face. Thought she has always enjoyed the record of always finishing first, she says when she got to St. Joseph's College she was confronted with a very tough contest for her number one spot and she had to supplement her God given brains with more sweat and prayer." I prayed a lot and asked God to give me strength, I do the best and he gives me the rest," goes her confession. Refilwe fought to the wire to finish Top of the 8th stars and she only missed the summit by two positions and finished third earning herself The Chairperson's award. Her step dad says the top three finish is a cherry on top of their happiness and her mother said she would cry if her daughter is in the surprise best three, hope you found your happy tears mum.

or an eight year old, boarding a plane to travel 12,569 kilometres in the skies above the waters of the seas doesn't come with any hard thought or a dilemma like choosing between two toys. Excited about leaving South Korea to Botswana, Yohan Jeong didn't know he is going to face a language barrier as he looked forward to a new life and schooling in a far-flung African continent.

The young boy landed in Botswana and immediately enrolled at Segoditshane Primary School. English which was expected to be the medium of communications at his new school immediately proved to be a challenge for Yohan, but in his quest for education he was not shy to learn, actually he confidently conversed with his peers in his not good English. His father still remembers the day he went to pick him from school for the first time, to his surprise he found Yohan with his new friends and the boy was so happy to introduce him to his friends. His father said Yohan proudly repeatedly chanted "Look, me father, me father". Nine years later Yohan doesn't only speak fluent English he passed his BGCSE examinations with flying colours, finishing amongst the Best Ten (10) Students in Botswana).

The 17 year old former Naledi Senior Secondary School student though a top achiever he did not have it with ease. His, started as a rough journey that he almost quit but it got better and smooth with time. For this he reckons studying is hard work. "My primary school days were rough because of the language barrier and I scored low marks," he reminisced. "It was so tough, and so discouraging" he said. Yohan emphasised the fact that he has his family to thank for always supporting and encouraging him never to give up because without the support he doesn't believe he could have braved the rough path he had to go through during his basic education school days.

Hard work as studying has proved to be, Yohan attests that with proper planning, setting clear goals and endurance of the hurdles experienced along the way, one can easily come out tops like he did. "There are always temptations which prevent every work to be achieved, but if we overcome temptations and procrastinations that students are always going through we can accomplish what we set to achieve," he advised. Yohan went on with his inspiration as he addressed Naledi Senior Secondary School students where compared real life to a car, he said "No matter how good an engine a car has, if the brakes are not working well, the car cannot be considered good rather it becomes a dangerous

vehicle which can take away life. Likewise, everyone has desires but if they have no self-control, they are just like a vehicle with bad brakes."

Naledi SSS School Head Mr. Othusitse Othusitse is proud of their product's achievement, which ensured the school kept its record of being represented in the Top Ten Achievers list. He admires the young man's discipline. "He was a level headed young man and never caused trouble in school," he commended. Mrs. Dipuo Keatimilwe his Head of House reckons that above Yohan's work rate was a good support system in form of his parents. Her words are endorsed by his class teacher Mrs. Caroline Mahlanza who believes his parents pushed him to work hard. "You could tell he is from a culture that promotes hard work and respect," she said. This she says made him pleasure to work with.

As noted by his teacher, the culture of respect reigns at Yohan's house. The family of five does not only limit the mutual respect amongst themselves, but also extends it to their guests. So knit is the family such that when Yohan was busy preparing for his exams his elder sister Dayoung Jeong says they missed him. His father Mr. Doojun Jeong, was surprised to learn his son was among the Top Ten students beating well over 40,000 candidates who also sat for the exam. "Botswana is full of intelligent students, this was not expected. It is a great honour," he noted. Yohan echoed his father's sentiments that his class had more intelligent student who were more capable than he was, so it could only mean he was more focused than them to finish above them. Joy can still be spotted on his mother's face even months after results have been released, she still can't believe her last born of three has defied the odds so much. She says she always encourage her children to deny themselves leisure time even and avoid destructions when they are studying even though it sometimes breaks their hearts.

Though studying is not a walk in the park as declared by the young man he says he likes watching television and playing computer games and made time for them. This he said he did to refresh and sometimes music and fellowship with the family were perfect substitutes: "Television helps in relaxing the mind," endorsed his father who however advised against getting carried away.

Yohan aspires to study medicine at the University of Botswana Medical School as he sees being a Doctor as the perfect platform to help

It was however, not love at first sight for the Kang born former St. Joseph's College student. The young man who believes to a large extent has a God given talent, did not love his studies during his early days of schooling. For two years he played with fire and got away with it but standard three was not as easy as its predecessors and it humbled him with a fail. It is this fail that saw him kiss and make up with learning and the two have lived happily ever after to date.

It was not so long after his matrimony with learning that he started reaping fruits of his labour as he made his debut to the Annual Excellence Awards stage and walked home with an accolade for being one of the best ten students in PSLE. This was perhaps the motivation he needed to hold on to his passion with books. Be that as it may be at JCE though he passed with flying colours but couldn't make the cut of an Excellence Award recipient, but he made up for that slip up by finishing as one of the BGCSE top achievers of class of 2016.

His love for knowledge and learning saw Bosa doing a lot of research especially from A Level material. His extensive learning did not go unnoticed by his teachers, actually his Class Teacher Mr. Ketlametse Dingalo on a few occasions asked him to take it easy on higher learning material. "The way he answered questions showed that he was reading higher education material," he noted. Dingalo went on to describe Bosa as a self motivated student who never despaired when results were not coming forth. All this was not just for amassing knowledge for the love of it; he wanted to be a top achiever and once asked his teacher to guide him on how to be one. Mr. Michael Tabona who served as his Head of House remembers Bosa as a very competitive student with so much knowledge in Maths and Science. "He wanted to register for statistics when he was doing Form 5 and I adviced him against it but he went ahead and he passed it," he revealed. As a result, Bosa did eleven instead of ten subjects. Tabona says Bosa

once told colleagues from his House that he was studying university mathematics.

According to Deputy School Head Mr. Herbert Setume Bosa's pursuit of perfection was a joint effort not only by the student and his parents but other stakeholders as well. 

For being such a loving and caring person her aunt thinks she would make a great social worker. Olebogeng has been admitted at the University of Free State in South Africa where she will pursue her BA in Social Work and Psychology Degree. She is currently volunteering at local school in her home village, as a translator for hearing impaired students.

2014 Golden Star Dimpho Gosenyang was her inspiration. She says while reading about Dimpho she realised she was always willing to work with her peers a leaf she borrowed and it worked for her.

e had finished his practical projects and was confident in a few weeks' time he would go into the examination room and pass his BGCSE examinations, but his fate was unknown to him. The Palapye born Top Achiever did not despair he took his challenging new twist head on.

Until October 2011 Legodile Mosenene would have never thought he would lose his sight and be partially paralysed; he had no reason to think that he was not fit as a fiddle as he had no no sign of any illness but only a mild influenza like cough. A few days on the traditional home remedy of warm water would have cured his cough but it was worse than that, he got diagnosed with Spinal Tuberculosis. Nonetheless he still was not worried because he trusted the TB treatment will take care of things but guess what; three days into the treatment he lost his sight.

Keitsheletse Mosenene, Legodile's mother reflects back on the fateful day with agony as she tries to contain her tears. She came back home and asked him if he was reading for his final examinations, but his response shocked her. "O raya ke bala jang mama, ke sa bone?" (How am I supposed to read when I cannot see Mum?) He is a reserved person who hardly makes jokes so she knew he defiantly was not joking but she still could not believe what she just heard from her son.

He had a glimpse of hope when doctors in South Africa told him that it was not all lost as they could help him regain his sight, but his next appointment got postponed a couple of times and when the doctors finally saw him again, they had sad news for him. It was too late to help him to see again.

Disappointed, hurt and confused he says he had no feeling of anger as he tried to make peace with the rather sudden change. At this point he did not only have to deal with losing sight but also with his lower body which was now paralysed, he had to take the double hit head on. "It was not easy to deal with the situation, I contemplated comitting suicide," he revealed. His composure and calmness when he talks about his ordeal, emphasises that he indeed is at peace and drawing the positive out of it. Though he never sought or got any professional counselling, church was enough solace and he was soon healed emotionally and looked forward to taking every step of life as it comes.

Legodile's next challenge was going back to class, he had no idea or plan on how he was

going to study without his eyes anymore, moreover braille was a mystery to him. That all noted he eventually went back to class at Molefi Senior Secondary School in Mochudi. It was never going to be an easy journey for him as he had to learn braille and the BGCSE syllabi concurrently. Nevertheless, the determination and hunger to learn was just what he needed, in not so long a time he had passed the two levels of braille and could now focus only on BGCSE. "I have always believed education could help me improve my family background," he shared. Legodile says living with a disability is very expensive but one should have perseverance and a never give up attitude.

His teachers at Molefi Senior Seconday School remembers him with lots of admiration. "He was a very determined student, I arranged extra lessons for him and he always attended them" said his Geography teacher Mr. Mooketsi Letshabo. He said Legodile was so focused to the extent of being a tutor to his classmates who did not have any vision impairment issues, by always willing to explain to them what they did not quite understand in class. This was also confirmed by Head of Special Education Mrs. Masego Thamage who says she was impressed mostly by how fast Legodile learnt braille.

Though relatively new to the school, the Deputy School Head Mrs. Gabankitse Magwape says she was surprised and charmed to learn that the student whose name appeared most on the prize giving list was a visually impaired student. Ms Mpolokeng Chake, HOD - Pastoral also has nothing but praises for their star who she says is an indicator that they really put an extra effort in Special Education. For his part, Head Teacher of the school Mr. Francis Semathane praised Legodile for being a fast learner that always came out tops of his class despite his challenges. "We have a challenge of shortage of special needs teaching aids but he was never discouraged," he commended.

At home he is a humble hard working child, yes hard working. Despite his disability sometimes his mother finds him bathing his siblings when she knocks off from work."I do not like him doing any work, but he always finds an excuse to help," shared the emotional mother. His granny who takes care of him when his mother is not home is also fond of her grounded grandson.

Legodile is going to study Media Studies at the University of Botswana and aspires to either be a radio or television personality because he wants to use the media to reach out to more disabled people.










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DETECTION OF MALPRACTICE

School heads, chief invigilators, invigilators, supervisors and Examination Council officials provide much of the evidence for malpractice. Evidence is also provided by candidates, parents and the public who witness malpractice, and from others disillusioned by the failure of bribed officials to deliver the expected level of support.

Examinations malpractice is a serious offence punishable by law. Any person who commits an offence shall be liable on conviction to a fine not less than P5 000.00 but not more than P8 000.00 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years , or to both such fine and imprisonment.

All enquiries and reports of examinations malpractice should be reported to the Executive Secretary Botswana Examinations Council either by form of writing or in person.
